Safe and secure

How we use and protect language, cultural and social needs

At UnitedHealthcare®, we help coordinate your care across all of your health care providers. To do that, we receive and share important information about you. This may include your race, ethnicity, language you speak, gender identity, sexual orientation and social needs. This data and other personal information about you is protected health information (PHI). We may share this information with your health care providers as part of treatment, payment and operations. This helps us meet your health care needs.

Examples of how we may use this information to improve our services include:

- To find gaps in care
- To help you in languages other than English
- To create programs that meet your needs
- To tell your health care providers which language(s) you speak

We do not use this data to deny coverage or limit benefits. We protect this information in the same way we protect all other PHI. Access is restricted to those employees who need to use it. Our buildings and computers are secured. Computer passwords and other system protections keep your data safe.

Caring for you

We want to make sure you get the care you need when you need it. If you need help getting to your provider's office, we can help. Our health plan offers transportation benefits to get you to appointments. Call Member Services at the phone number on Page 10 to learn more.

If you need to see a provider right away, you can get after-hours care at urgent care centers. We also have a NurseLine that you can call anytime – 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Call 1-877-440-0255, TTY 711.

Your medication benefits

What you need to know

Visit our website to learn about your prescription medication benefits. It includes information on:

- 1. What medications are covered. There is a list of covered medications. You may need to use a generic medication in place of a brandname medication.
- 2. Where to get your prescriptions filled. You can find a pharmacy near you that accepts your plan. You may also be able to get certain medications by mail.
- 3. Rules that may apply. Some medications may only be covered in certain cases. For example, you might need to try a different medication first. (This is called step therapy.) Or you might need approval from UnitedHealthcare to use a medication. (This is called prior authorization.) There also might be limits to the amount you can get of certain medications.
- 4. Any costs to you. You may have copayments for prescriptions.

Utilization management

The right care

Utilization management (UM) helps make sure you receive the right care and services when you need them. Our UM staff reviews the services your provider asks for. They compare the care and services your provider asks for against clinical practice guidelines. They also compare what is being asked for against your benefits.

When the care is not covered under your benefits, it may be denied. It may also be denied when it does not meet clinical practice guidelines. We do not pay or reward our providers or staff for denying services or approving less care. If care is denied, you and your provider have a right to appeal. The denial letter will tell you how.

Vaccines

Part D coverage

Except for vaccines covered under Medicare Part B (medical insurance), Medicare medication plans must cover all commercially available vaccines (like the shingles vaccine) when medically necessary to prevent illness.

How we keep your personal information safe

We take your privacy seriously. We are very careful with your family's protected health information (PHI). We also guard your financial information (FI). We use PHI and FI to run our business. It helps us provide products, services and information to you.


We protect oral, written and electronic PHI and FI throughout our business. We have rules and technology that keep PHI and FI safe. We don't want PHI or FI to get lost or destroyed. We want to make sure no one misuses it. We check to make sure we use PHI and FI carefully.

We have policies that explain:

- How we may use PHI and FI
- When we may share PHI and FI with others
- What rights you have to your family's PHI and FI

Primary care

Take charge

Preparing for your provider visit can help you get the most out of it. So can making sure your provider knows about all the care you get. Here are 4 ways you can take charge of your health care:

- Think about what you want to get out of the visit before you go. Focus on the top 3 things you need help with.
- 2. Tell your provider about any medications or vitamins you take. Bring a written list. Or bring the actual medicines. Mention who prescribed them for you.

- 3. Tell your provider about other providers you see. Include behavioral health providers. Bring copies of any test results or treatment plans from other providers.
- 4. If you were in the hospital or emergency room (ER), see your provider as soon as possible after you go home. Share your discharge instructions with them. Proper follow-up may prevent another hospital admission or visit to the ER.

UnitedHealthcare Community Plan has a quality improvement program. It works to give members better health care and services. Each year we set goals. Then we measure how well we meet them.

Some of our goals focus on improving the number of services pregnant members and children receive. These include postpartum visits, well checkups and immunizations. Other goals focus on making sure people with certain diseases — such as diabetes — get the tests they need. Sometimes a member needs to go to the hospital or emergency room for a mental health issue. When this happens, our goal

is that they see a mental health professional after they go home.

We also survey our members each year. We want to see how they feel about our health plan. We use your feedback to improve the services we offer, including our provider network and customer service. This year we are working on improving our members' digital experience.

Substance use

Managing pain

Alternatives to opioids

Dealing with pain is not easy. You may be prescribed medication. It can help you manage your pain. This may include over-thecounter medications. Or it may be prescription painkillers, such as opioids. However, you may want to consider other options beyond medication. Here are some other ways you can manage pain.

Mind-body techniques

These may include activities like meditation, mindfulness or breathing exercises. There is often a mental part to pain. These techniques can help with that. Studies have shown that meditation can change how your brain processes pain.

Exercise

Exercise has a lot of health benefits. Managing pain is one of them. Walking, swimming or stretching can be good options. Being inactive can lead to feeling pain. Exercise works against that. You can do exercise with mindfulness through activities like yoga or chair yoga.

Are you free of HIV?

Get tested during pregnancy to be sure

Without treatment, 1 out of 4 pregnant people with HIV will give it to their babies. HIV is the virus that causes AIDS. Fortunately, there is a treatment that works very well. HIV treatment lowers the amount of HIV in the body. Treatment during pregnancy has 2 goals:

- 1. To protect your own health
- 2. To help prevent passing HIV to your baby

It's also important for women with HIV not to breastfeed their babies. This can help protect the babies from getting HIV. Today, because of prevention and treatment, only a small number of babies are born with HIV in the United States each year.



Planning to get pregnant? Make sure you get tested for HIV.
